I helped him some and he got the plug points reinstalled and some of the lights were working by the time we left. The church has asked him to come back later in the year and finish. They will buy the materials that are needed for him to complete the work.

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Finance

It has been a while since we mentioned the exchange rate and the effect that has on our ministry. We listen to the report on the radio each day and wonder what can make it fluctuate so much.

There are many factors that can affect the exchange rate. It may be the illness or death of a leader somewhere in the world or unrest or even weather. You may have heard about the problems in the mining industry which resulted from strikes and attacks of miners on police and security and retaliation by police on the miners. It resulted in the exchange rate moving in our favor, but things have settled a bit and the rate has moved against us. We never know from day to day what the rate will be or what could affect it!

Several years ago we gave up trying to second guess the exchange rate and we now cash our check on whichever day near the 25th is convenient for us. Sometimes we gain and other times we lose, but in the end we decided that was still the best way to do it.

Over the past 12 months the rates have ranged from a low of R7.36 to the dollar to a high of R8.22 to the dollar. The average is R7.86 for the year. During this time electricity, security fees, and fuel (gasoline and diesel for our vehicles) have increased.

All in all it has been trying, but God has blessed us through those of you who continue to support us financially. Thank you!
